#### **FEATURES**

Termite adults are soft-bodied, light-colored and about onefourth inch in length. If wings are present, they are clear and similar in size. The antennae are short. The nymph resembles a wingless adult. Eyes may or may not be present.

### **BEHAVIORS**

Termites may be found statewide in Illinois. The king and queen are the most well-developed sexually and also have wings and eyes. The queen may live for several years, laying thousands of eggs. Kings and queens are produced only in certain seasons, leaving the colony in a swarm to mate and begin new colonies. Other reproductive individuals may be present within a colony to assist the queen. Worker termites are nymphs and sterile adults. They are pale and lack wings and eyes. Workers perform most of the work of the colony. Soldiers are sterile adults. They have a large head and jaws. Their job is to protect the colony. Termites eat shed skins and feces of other termites, dead termites and plant materials. They have protozoans or bacteria within their intestine to digest the cellulose in their food. They often groom each other with their mouthparts.
