

GRedSpot 3.6 - February 18th, 1994

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GRedSpot is a shareware MicroSoft Windows 3.x program that displays the current position of the Great Red Spot on the planet Jupiter, and the four Galilean moons Io, Europa, Ganymede and Callisto in an icon. You can set the icon to display the moons above or below a half-icon of Jupiter, just show the moons or just display the full Jupiter icon. You can specify the icon's title to display the current longitude of the Spot, a list of today's transit times, and the time remaining until the next transit. If you wish, you can also configure the title to just be a clock, displaying the current time and/or date.

Simply use the Program Manager to create a New Program Icon in the group of your choice and set the *Working Directory* to the subdirectory where you installed the program files. You may place the files in the subdirectory of your choice, but the software **must** be able to find it's GREDSLOT.INI file there.

If it cannot find the .INI file, then the **About** box will be displayed *each and every time* you start **GRedSpot**. See the section [Troubleshooting](#) for more information.

I also recommend placing the Program Icon in the **Startup** group so it loads every time you start Windows.

If you don't already have the file **BWCC.DLL**, make sure you copy it to your Windows system subdirectory and erase any other older copies of it. See the file BWCC.TXT for more information.

Before you can use **GRedSpot**, you need to tell it where you live and how to adjust for daylight savings time. You can also select **many** different options as well. Select the following links for more information:

Once you have set all the above options, you will probably want to have a look at how you can [change the icon's title](#). This option allows you to configure the title to display various information about Jupiter and it's moons.

GRedSpot must know the **time zone** in which you live to display the icon properly. The default is the Eastern Standard Time time zone, which is valid for cities in the United States such as New York City, Boston and Miami. If you live in another time zone, you must select it yourself.

When you first run **GRedSpot**, the program's **About** box appears. Here you'll find a list box containing all of the world's time zones. Simply select the one in which you live.

There is a check box if you want the **Daylight Savings Time** (Summer Time) adjustment applied or not. Check this box if your area observes Daylight Savings Time. Just below this, there are four radio buttons to determine which set of summer-time dates you wish to use. If you select *Manual*, the daylight savings time adjustment will be applied **regardless** of today's date. This means you must change the above check box twice a year when the time changes. You may need to select this option if your region is not listed below. Tables that list the daylight savings time start/stop dates for the other radio buttons follow below. If you select one of these, the daylight savings time adjustment will be applied or not-applied **automatically** based on today's date. All daylight savings time adjustments subtract 1 hour from the current time.

United States:

1994 - Start: April 3rd	End: October 30th
1995 - Start: April 2nd	End: October 29th
1996 - Start: April 7th	End: October 27th
1997 - Start: April 6th	End: October 26th

UK:

1994 - Start: March 27th	End: October 23rd
1995 - Start: March 26th	End: October 22nd
1996 - Start: March 24th	End: October 27th
1997 - Start: March 23rd	End: October 26th

Europe:

1994 - Start: March 27th	End: September 25th
1995 - Start: March 26th	End: September 24th
1996 - Start: March 24th	End: September 22nd
1997 - Start: March 23rd	End: September 28th

If you live in one of these regions and the above dates are incorrect, OR if you live in another region not listed above, please contact me with the correct dates so I can update my software.

You can also select an **update interval** for the **GRedSpot** icon. The default is *Real-Time*, which shows the current position of the Spot. South is at the top to match the view in a telescope. Other values are available to **animate** the icon, or to display a new icon once every update interval. The values you may choose from are once every second, once every five seconds or once every ten seconds.

Note that when the Spot is on the far side of Jupiter, it is still visible as a dotted outline.

You can also have the icon **rotate** in the normal forward direction, or in reverse. Just click on the appropriate radio button.

You can change the **title** beneath the icon to whatever you like. More importantly, you can have other information such as transit times displayed here as well.

The **About** box has the default icon title set to $\sim\mathbf{N}$, which is a special "code" to display the number of hours and minutes until the next transit.

If you prefer, you can change the title to be just a simple word or two, like "Jupiter" or "Jupiter's Great Red Spot". This may be necessary to work with some screen savers.

All the available options are listed below:

Jupiter options:

- $\sim\mathbf{N}$ = Next transit time in expanded format (i.e. "Next transit: 5 hours, 32 min" and "Last transit: 46 minutes ago").
- $\sim\mathbf{n}$ = Next transit time in hh:mm format.
- $\sim\mathbf{L}$ = List all transit times for today. Used in conjunction with $\sim\mathbf{1}$, $\sim\mathbf{2}$, $\sim\mathbf{a}$, $\sim\mathbf{A}$, $\sim\mathbf{p}$, $\sim\mathbf{P}$ described below. (i.e. " $\sim\mathbf{L}\sim\mathbf{a}\sim\mathbf{1}$ " displays times such as "12:23am, 10:15am, 8:03pm"). Note that the 'a' comes before the '1', the opposite of how these options work when configuring the icon title as a clock (see *Clock options* below).
- $\sim\mathbf{c}$ = Central Meridian relative to Earth to the nearest degree (i.e. 273°). Zero degrees means the Great Red Spot is directly facing Earth, 180° means it's facing directly away, etc.
- $\sim\mathbf{C}$ = Central Meridian to the nearest one-tenth of a degree (i.e. 273.4°).
- $\sim\mathbf{g}$ = Great Red Spot's Meridian to the nearest whole degree.
- $\sim\mathbf{G}$ = Great Red Spot's Meridian to the nearest one-tenth of a degree.
- $\sim\mathbf{T}$ = Time next transit will occur. Use with "Clock options" below. (i.e. "Next Transit: $\sim\mathbf{T}\sim\mathbf{1}\sim\mathbf{a}$ " will display as "Next Transit: 8:03pm")
If there are no more transits today, "Tomorrow" will be displayed.

Satellite options:

- $\sim\mathbf{s1}$ = Show Io's orbital degree position (Use $\sim\mathbf{S1}$ to the nearest 1/10th)
- $\sim\mathbf{s2}$ = Show Europa's orbital degree position (Use $\sim\mathbf{S2}$ to the nearest 1/10th)
- $\sim\mathbf{s3}$ = Show Ganymede's orbital degree position (Use $\sim\mathbf{S3}$ to the nearest 1/10th)
- $\sim\mathbf{s4}$ = Show Callisto's orbital degree position (Use $\sim\mathbf{S4}$ to the nearest 1/10th)

Clock options:

- $\sim\mathbf{1}$ = 12-hour format
- $\sim\mathbf{2}$ = 24-hour format
- $\sim\mathbf{a}$ = "am" or "pm"
- $\sim\mathbf{A}$ = "AM" or "PM"
- $\sim\mathbf{p}$ = "a" or "p"
- $\sim\mathbf{P}$ = "A" or "P"
- $\sim\mathbf{w}$ = Weekday name as "Mon", "Tue", etc.

- ~W = Weekday name as "Monday", "Tuesday", etc.
- ~m = Month name as "Jan", "Feb", etc.
- ~M = Month name as "January", "February", etc.
- ~h = Month number (1-12)
- ~d = Day of the month number (1-31)
- ~y = Year as "94", etc. (Year without the century)
- ~Y = Year as "1994", etc. (Year with the century)
- ~o = Ordinal suffix of "Day of the month" as "st", "nd", "rd", "th", etc. (as in 1st, 2nd, 3rd, 4th, etc.)

Example icon titles:

Feel free to experiment with different combinations to suit your taste.

In the **About** box, there's a field for the **longitude** of the Great Red Spot. Each location on the surface of a solid planet such as Earth will always remain, of course, at the same latitude and longitude. The Great Red Spot, however, is a huge "storm" high in Jupiter's atmosphere. Because of this, and also due to the fast rotation speed of the planet (the fastest in the Solar System), it has been known to "drift" up to several degrees in longitude. Currently, the Great Red Spot's longitude is 35 degrees relative to the planet's Central Meridian. You may want to consult your favorite astronomy magazine a few times a year so you can adjust this longitude value for the best possible accuracy.

You can select one of many different **background colors**. The default is black, but you can select white or a shade of gray if you prefer. The "transparent" color allows you to display Jupiter with no background, appearing on top of whatever is beneath it.

In addition to the **About** box, there is also another dialog box called **Galilean Satellites** to configure the display of the four major Jovian moons discovered by Galileo: Io, Europa, Ganymede and Callisto. You can set the program to display the moons either above or below a half-icon of Jupiter, show just the moons in the center of the icon space, or display the full icon of Jupiter. Simply click on the appropriate radio button.

You can also select the Satellite Colors, the Inclination angle of the satellites, and the size of Jupiter and the moons.

You can view the Satellite Orbital Periods here.

You can set the **colors** of the moons and the small image of Jupiter by changing the Red, Green and Blue values to the ones you want. Each color value is from 0 (no color) to 255 (full color). By mixing and matching the values, you can create any color you wish.

You can change the **size** of each moon from one pixel (the default) to two pixels. Likewise, the size of Jupiter can be changed from 2 pixels to four. Please note, however, that the scale of the Jovian system is exaggerated when the larger pixel sizes are used, but the icon is easier to view from a distance this way.

An important feature on the **Galilean Satellites** dialog box is the **Incline Angle**. The radio buttons default to *As seen from Earth*. Presently and for the next few years, the plane of Jupiter's moons is tilted approximately 3 degrees with respect to the Earth. **GRedSpot** defaults to this value when displaying the moons, creating an image as seen from a small telescope or binoculars. For an overhead view of Jupiter, click on the radio button *Above Jupiter looking down*. This automatically sets the Incline Angle to 90 degrees and sets the radio button for *Only show the moons*. Earth is now directly "down" from the icon; moons that are "above" Jupiter are behind the planet, or farther from Earth, and those that are "below" Jupiter are in front, or nearer to Earth.

The *Other* radio button lets you select your own inclination angle and does not change any other button settings. After clicking this button, enter your own value from -90 to 90 degrees.

Experiment with different values and combinations until you find a viewing angle that suits your taste.

Io: 1 day, 18 hours, 28 minutes
Europa: 3 days, 13 hours, 14 minutes
Ganymede: 7 days, 3 hours, 43 minutes
Callisto: 16 days, 16 hours, 32 minutes

You can click the *Icon is always on top of windows* button **on** to have the **GRedSpot** icon stay visible when other windows are covering it. When on, the icon will always appear "on top of" the other windows instead of being "hidden" beneath them.

When you select the **GRS Transit Times** window, the current date and time, the position of the Spot displayed in degrees, and all of today's transit times in 24-hour format are displayed and updated every few seconds. The orbital position in degrees for each moon is also displayed.

Press the Minimize button in the upper right corner to shrink the window back to an icon.

In the default configuration, **GRedSpot** displays the time until the next transit beneath the icon. Since this will automatically update the icon's title once per minute, this may cause some **screen savers**, which can sense such activity, to never activate. A simple solution is to change the *Icon Title* field in the About box to some simple word or words, such as "Jupiter" or "Jupiter's Great Red Spot". You will not be able to use **GRedSpot**'s clock feature (although you could still display the date), but your screen savers should work again.

Look for EARTHSxx.ZIP, a Windows icon that shows the current sunlit-side of Earth, MARSICxx.ZIP, a Windows icon that shows the current view of the planet Mars and SOLSYSxx.ZIP, a Windows icon that shows the current position of the nine planets in our Solar System. All three have been released and are available at the Internet FTP site **oak.oakland.edu** and it's mirrors, **ftp.cica.indiana.edu** and it's mirrors, and at the Software Creations BBS, **(508) 365-2359** (2400,N,8,1), all in the USA. All users receive the shareware versions of these programs when they register.

The current versions are **EARTHS26.ZIP**, **MARSIC26.ZIP** and **SOLSYS10.ZIP**.

Print out the file ORDER.FRM to get a quick order form for registering **GRedSpot**. This shareware version is not cripple-ware, nag-ware or free-ware, although it will remind you every 5 times to register until the evaluation period expires. When you do register, you will receive the latest executable version that allows **UNLIMITED** use of the program with no reminder box and no expiration.

All future versions/upgrades of this program are **FREE** to registered users. When a new shareware version becomes available, just download it and copy the new files to the registered version's subdirectory. It's that simple!

The cost of the diskette and the mailing charges are all included in the **US \$10** registration fee. Personal checks, money orders and American Express travelers checks are all accepted (sorry, I do not yet accept credit card orders). If you wish, you may register for US \$20 and receive the full Borland C++ 3.1 source code and Windows resource files used to make this program as well. The source code for each future version will be available **free** for registered source-code users.

If you find **GRedSpot** useful, please upload it to other bulletin boards and/or Internet FTP sites so other people can enjoy it, too!

If you have improved the existing **icons**, or have created any new icons to improve the animation, please send them to me and I might include them, along with your name and my thanks, in future versions. If I use your contributions, you will receive the latest registered executable version **free**, including the **source code**, for your efforts.

If you get the **About** box each and every time you start the program, make **sure** you have the program icon's *Working Directory* set to the directory where you have the GREDSLOT.EXE file. This allows the program to properly find its .INI file. Make sure your GREDSLOT.INI file is in the same subdirectory as the GREDSLOT.EXE file; if it isn't, move it to that subdirectory. This is the recommended way to keep all of **GRedSpot**'s files together.

If you prefer, you may also set the *Working Directory* to your Windows subdirectory explicitly, or just leave it blank to have it default to your Windows subdirectory. Again, just make **sure** that GREDSLOT.INI is, indeed, located there.

Finally, make sure the .INI file is marked as read/write (this is the default); do **NOT** mark this file as read-only.

If you're familiar with the idea behind Shareware, then you know that Shareware is the ultimate in **money-back guarantees**.

Most money-back guarantees work like this: You pay for the product and then have some period of time to try it out and see whether or not you like it.
