# **Registration Information**

**INledit** is a commercial software application distributed as shareware. This means that you may use and evaluate **INledit** for 21 days. If, after 21 days, you wish to continue using **INledit** you must send a registration fee of \$25.00 (U.S.) to the author. Otherwise you must stop using **INledit** and remove it from your system.

Payment must be in U.S. funds drawn from a U.S. bank. Foreign money orders and personal checks drawn on foreign banks will not be accepted due to the fees involved in cashing them. Cash is acceptable (isn't it always?).

# Introduction

Most Microsoft(tm) Windows applications, and Windows itself, use "INI" files to store configuration information. The Windows 3. 0 documentation refers to these files as initialization files. The most famous of all INI files is the WIN.INI file. If you have been using Windows for any length of time, you probably have, at the minimum, seen the contents of your WIN.INI file.

**INIedit** is a Windows 3 application designed to make modifying, viewing, and printing Windows INI files easy. The application itself is composed of two files, INIEDIT.EXE and CEKLIB.DLL. Both files are required in order for **INIedit** to operate.

**INIedit** was developed for Windows 3.0 and Windows 3.1 using the Microsoft Windows 3.0 Software Development Kit, the Microsoft C Compiler Version 6.00A, and the Microsoft Macro Assembler Version 5.10. The documentation was produced using Microsoft Word For Windows Version 2.0.

# What are INI files

In Windows 1.x and 2.x all applications and the system used WIN.INI to store configuration information. With the introduction of Windows 3.0 came "Private" INI files. Except for a few oddball applications all INI files are stored in the directory that Windows is installed in. This directory is named WINDOWS by default, but may be different on your system. Also, all INI files have the extension .INI; which is why they are called INI files.

INI files have a specific format. There are *sections*, *keynames*, and *values*.<sup>1</sup> A section is a group of keynames. Each keyname has associated with it a value.

Sections are delimited by square brackets ('[' and ']'). Keynames are assigned a value using an equal sign ('='). For example in the WIN.INI file there is a section titled 'Windows', that is used to store information about your Windows setup. A typical [Windows] section might appear in the WIN.INI file as:

[Windows]
spooler=yes
run=
Beep=yes
NullPort=None
device=Apple LaserWriter II NTX,PSCRIPT,LPT2:
BorderWidth=4
Programs=pif exe com bat
MouseSpeed=1
load=clock.exe

If look at the contents of your WINDOWS directory you will notice many INI files (from DOS type DIR C:\WINDOWS\\*.INI). Windows 3.0 applets like Control Panel and CardFile each have their own INI files (CONTROL.INI and CARDFILE.INI respectively). Older Windows applications that were written for Windows 2.x still may store their data in the WIN.INI file. A good example of this is WinWord.

Another INI file that is very important to Windows 3.0 is the SYSTEM.INI file. SYSTEM.INI contains information about the Windows 3.0 "system", such as the display driver and 386 Enhanced Mode "Virtual Device Drivers." **INIedit** can be particularly helpful when editing the SYSTEM.INI file (but BE CAREFUL!). There is one catch, however, as the [386Enh] section of the SYSTEM.INI file breaks an important rule for INI file formatting: it has many lines with the same keyname (device=) and different values. **INIedit** will not allow you to modify the [386Enh] section of SYSTEM.INI for this reason. If you must edit the [386Enh] section, use the "Edit with Notepad" feature of **INIedit**.

# More Information on SYSTEM.INI and WIN.INI

For documentation on many of the sections and keynames in the WIN.INI and SYSTEM.INI files read the files WININI.TXT, WININI2.TXT, SYSINI.TXT, SYSINI2.TXT, and SYSINI3.TXT that were placed in your WINDOWS directory when you installed

Windows 3.0.

# Instructions

**INIedit** has been designed so that it is very easy to use. Because **INIedit** is capable of altering your Windows setup in such a way that Windows will fail to work it is suggested you read over the following instructions.

# **BACK UP YOUR INI FILES REGULARLY!**

## Installation

**INIEdit** is easy to install. Simply copy the files **INIEDIT.EXE** and **CEKLIB.DLL** to a directory in your path (many Windows 3.0 users have a directory called "C:\ WINAPPS").

Using *Program Manager's* "File.New" menu item, create *Program Manager Item* for **INIedit**.

To start **INledit**, simply double click on the **INledit** icon.

**IMPORTANT:** Make sure the file CEKLIB.DLL is in a directory that is in your PATH statement in your AUTOEXEC.BAT file!

# **Starting INIedit**

To start **INIedit**, follow the procedure you would for starting any Windows Application. If you have created a *Program Manager Item* for **INIedit**, simply double click on the icon. You can also double click on "INIEDIT.EXE" from within *File Manager* or *The MS-DOS Executive*.

If you have not registered your copy of **INledit** you will be presented with two dialog boxes each time **INledit** starts. The first dialog box provides information about registering **INledit**. The second dialog box provides two edit control in which you will enter your registration information (See *Registration Information* for more information on registration).

Once you enter your registration information these two dialog boxes will not appear again.

# **Using INIedit**

The main **INledit** window has four areas of interest:

- 1) The Menu Bar,
- 2) the "INI filename:" dropdown combo box,
- 3) the "Sections/Application Names" box,
- 4) and the "Name = Value" box.

# The Menu Bar

The menu bar in **INledit** has two top level items on it: File and About!. Below are descriptions of each menu item:

# File.Open...

Pops up a dialog box that allows you to select an INI file that is not in your WINDOWS directory. Some applications choose to store their INI files in their own directory. The "INI filename" combo box in the main window only contains files found in the WINDOWS directory.

# File.Edit With Notepad

In some cases you may wish to view and/or edit the current INI file with the Notepad editor. If you choose this menu item NOTEPAD.EXE will be launched with the current INI filename.

**INIedit** does not allow you to edit the [386Enh] section of SYSTEM.INI due to the fact that this section is not in the standard Windows INI file format. Use the **File.Edit With Notepad** menu item to launch notepad when you wish to edit the [386Enh] section of SYSTEM.INI.

#### File.Print

Prints the current INI file to the the default system printer or the printer specified using the **File.Printer Setup...** menu item.

# File.Printer Setup...

Pops up a dialog box that allows you to select and configure the printer you want **INIedit** to use when the **File.Print** menu item is selected.

#### About!

Pops up a dialog box that gives copyright information about **INledit**. This dialog box also contains the version number of **INledit** and of **CEKLIB.DLL**. When reporting bugs, or requesting help, it is helpful to include these version numbers. Clicking on the icon in the main window has the same effect as this menu item.

# The "INI filename" Combo Box

This combo box contains all INI files that exist in your WINDOWS directory. When you select a file in this combo box that file becomes the current INI file. The "Sections/Application Names" list box is filled with all sections in the INI file and the "Keyname=Value" list box is filled with all keynames and values found in the first section of the INI file. All items are listed in alphabetical order.

# The "Sections/Applications" Box

This box contains a list box with all of the sections in the current INI file. You can add a new section using the "Add" button, or delete an existing section using the "Remove" button.

When you highlight a section in this list box, the keynames and values found in that section will be listed in the "Keyname=Value" list box below.

**CAUTION:** The "Remove" button is potentially dangerous! Once you

"Remove" a section with this button, that section and ALL of it's keynames and values are removed. Use with care!

The "Keynames=Value" Box
This box contains a list box with all of the keynames and values found in the current section of the current INI file.

The "Add" button allows you to add a new keyname with value. Be careful that you do not "Add" a keyname that already exists, or you will overwrite it.

The "Edit" button allows you to edit the currently highlighted keyname and value. Double clicking on a keyname has the same effect as pressing the "Edit" button.

The "Remove" button will delete the current keyname = value line from the current INI file.
